Although my parents were not overt in their outward devotions and expressions of faith, they were in church every Sunday and Holy Day. They attended adult Sunday School and other classes. They were diligent in seeing that I was in the children's choirs, Sunday School, Confirmation Classes, Vacation Bible School, and Luther League. This upbringing meant that the passive path was one of faith participation. I would have had to

First, is the accident of birth. I was born into a church going family.

Why are you a Christian?

Second, is having a concrete faith experience. In places with a explicit decision theology it could be said that I had an adolescent "born again" experience. This experience came through my participation in a charismatic "Jesus People" commune that met on Sunset Boulevard in Hollywood when I was in high school. Even at the time I questioned much of the theology espoused in the place, and I today would have no problem labeling it as cult. However, the emotional experience of God's presence that I experienced was real and it did indeed make my faith life more real and personal. I certainly would not propose that such an experience is essential to a life of Christian faith, but I would also firmly hold that it was a positive part of my Christian faith journey.

Third, is an intellectual assent to a Christian understanding of life, society, and the universe. Obviously, this space does not allow one to expound deeply on any systematic understanding of Christianity, but an intellectual commitment to Christianity has been an essential part of my faith life. I was blessed to go a large public University in Los Angeles that had a small Religious Studies department. I majored in that field, and in those classes I was exposed to modern Biblical studies, the psychology and philosophy of religion, and the intellectual expressions of faith. I became fluent in Classical Greek and Latin. I was particularly inspired by a semester spent studying Paul Tillich's Systematic Theology.

Why are you a Christian? Continued

Fourth, is life experience. In my parish ministry I have done more than 600 funerals. I have also spent time with countless people suffering through illness, addiction, divorce, depression, personal struggles, and more. As I have aged I have also had my share of such struggles. Life only makes sense to me if we can see ourselves as looking through "the glass darkly" into the infinity of the God who is in, above, and beyond the created order. The faith gives us individually and collectively, as the Church, the foundation we need to meet the challenges of life and to be a positive force in the lives of others, our communities, and society as a whole. I am a Christian because I have experienced the God who gives our existence meaning and hope.

What do you hope for from a congregation?

- 1. A commitment to the ministry of Jesus Christ that overrides the commitment to the status quo. The majority of people who participate in the life of a congregation like the congregation and find meaning in its activities. If they did not, they would not be a part of the congregation. This is obviously a good thing. However, it does mean that the active members of a congregation have a natural tendency to be invested in "things as they are". I would hope, however, for a commitment to ministry that allows a congregation to look beyond themselves in order to expand and adapt ministry.
- 2. An open and trusting environment that encourages competent positive individuals to volunteer to serve in leadership positions within the congregation.
- 3. A sense of joy in the Lord. It is easy to fall into a "ministry as drudgery" mindset. I would hope for a sense that it is a privilege to be the Lord's servants. A congregation is blessed when its members can find joy in each other and in the ministry that God has called them to do together.

- 1. Building a sense of Christian fellowship among the rostered and lay leaders of the synod. This sense of fellowship is essential for facilitating our common ministries and discerning where the Lord is leading us.
- 2. Resizing our congregational and synod structures to serve current realities. Much of our ministry is based in structures that developed to serve the realities of twenty five years ago. An illustration of this is watching congregations with twenty in worship struggling to find twelve people to serve on the congregational council.
- 3. Finding ways to provide quality preaching and sacramental administration in each place our people gather. This includes such things as raising up candidates for ordination, answering hard questions about lay leadership at sacramental services, training lay leaders, and continuing education for rostered leaders. We probably could gain much insight by examining the best practices of other synods, ecumenical partners, and even other Christians with whom we often have too little contact.





Pernelle DeVore


What do you hope for from a congregation?




I am a Christian not only because I believe Jesus is the Son of God, but also because I firmly believe in the Theology of the Cross.

What should our three (3) primary areas of focus be for the Allegheny Synod in the next five (5) years?

First: Obviously, the Allegheny Synod needs to elect a bishop who can serve them well and more congregational leaders, whether ordained pastors or lay leaders or whatever can work for us, so that our congregations have a reliable source of "leadership" into the future. For various reasons some congregations seem to have lost their focus on serving God by serving others and have become more obsessed with their buildings, doing things the same old way, and are not interested in working to spread the Gospel.

Second: Unfortunately, we need to have more leaders who are concerned with ministry rather than their own needs. I imagine this is the case in many congregations and denominations, not just in this synod. When I gather with other pastors, there is certainly more talk about salaries, benefits, mileage, and other forms of compensations than there is about ministry, either within their own congregations or in wanting to work with other congregations to spread the Gospel by what they say and do as a synod. I know this is a difficult one!

Third: More synod-wide events, including educational events for clergy, lay leaders, and lay people would help us to get to know each other better, learn more about living the Christian life, asking questions about theology, and just sharing experiences. From what I remember, "synod" means "walking together," but the Allegheny Synod does not seem to do that!





Becky Horn

What do you hope for from a congregation?

What should our three (3) primary areas of focus be for the Allegheny Synod in the next five (5) years?

First, we should focus on what it means to love all people and turn this into a focus of any and all ministries we support.

Second, we should focus on reducing the number of buildings used for congregations, seeking to better utilize the resources of each congregation for the common good and care of neighbor. Third, we need to focus on what it means to live faithfully as Christians in our daily lives, including but not limited to, how we interact in society and our civil engagement.





Marty Jo Irvin-Stellabotte

My faith has been an important part of my life ever since I was a little girl and I've always considered myself a Christian. As I grew older and my faith matured, I began to have a personal relationship with Jesus and learned to rely upon him during both the good and the challenging times in my life. After becoming Lutheran more than 25 years ago and discovering the grace and love that God has for each of us, the life of Jesus and the example he set for us to live became so compelling to me that I wanted to share his good news of love for all people. My time in seminary further strengthened my faith as a follower of Christ as I began to have a greater understanding of the Jesus in the gospels and how I could live as he commanded and point others to follow Jesus.

What do you hope for from a congregation?

One of my favorite verses is Hebrews 10:24-25, "...let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together...but encouraging one another." This is my hope for a congregation – that we in the Allegheny Synod would continually encourage one another in love, welcoming all who enter with the love of Christ and offering radical hospitality and acceptance of ALL people. Because of the love, grace, and forgiveness that God shows us, we would be empowered to share that love to our neighbors in need by helping those in our communities and throughout our nation and the world through our good deeds.

- (1) Increase visibility through outreach and involvement in our communities such as food giveaways, soup kitchens, and celebration gatherings that offer more visibility for the Allegheny Synod and the ELCA, enhanced through grant funding and partnerships. Many of our congregations are small but if we work together and collaborate regionally instead of staying in our silos, we can do great things that help point others to Christ. This increased visibility would help individuals and congregations see the work and the value of the synod. This will also help provide much-needed services to our neighbors in need, especially in the midst of government cuts for many of these programs.
- (2) Develop more partnerships and collaborations. Most congregations have been affected by reduced attendance and giving since the pandemic and smaller churches struggle to stay open. By exploring multi-point parish arrangements with our full communion partners and tapping into lay leader resources with our partners, we can help lessen some of the financial burden our congregations are facing as well as the increased challenge of filling empty pulpits. This may also help in retaining congregations that have considered joining the NALC.
- (3) Actively recruit pastors and deacons to the Allegheny Synod, as well as increase the pool of lay worship leaders to help fill the current vacancies in our synod.


What should our three (3) primary areas of focus be for the Allegheny Synod in the next five (5) years?

What should our three (3) primary areas of focus be for the Allegheny Synod in the next five (5) years?

In no particular order ...

- 1) Improve clear and timely communications from the Synod Office to Rostered leaders
- 2) Continued outreach of Social Ministry to all areas of the Synod territory
- 3) support of and cooperation with the Bishop
